### FROM THE PRESIDENT

Migrants and Street Vendors are two new groups with whom CWS has started work this year. Besides, the area and the number of people covered under the palliative care programme has almost doubled. The activities and the statistics connected with them as presented in the Annual Report are impressive.

This year I want to travel on a different track and talk about invisibles connected with our activities which are neither noticed nor reported in an Annual Report. Let me give you two examples to illustrate what I mean by invisibles.

Let us take the example of our palliative care programme. We can't measure how much joy it brings into the life of a terminal-ly ill patient, the relief it provides to the members of the family or the effect it has on the neighbours or the positive effect it has on the society to take care of the old, sick and the infirm. We don't measure these positive factors because we just can't.

Think of our work among the youth in the slums. How it may protect a person from alcoholism and drug abuse, make him or her a better son or daughter for their parents or influence some youth in the locality to become better citizens.

There are hundreds and thousands of people who are positively influenced by the activities of CWS which are unnoticed and unreported. You need a third eye to see these invisibles. It fills my heart with joy when I think of the butterfly effect which our organisation's existence has on the lives of people which are not covered by this Annual Report.

I thank all of you for your kind support to CWS in various ways and assure you that we will try to excel ourselves in the coming year.



## MESSAGE

### FROM THE GOVERNING BODY

The year under review saw the return of normalcy after the Covid pandemic, though there were a few cases of Covid-19 for a short-lived period. As we were returning to the regular and normal way of living and conducting business as usual, we at the Community Welfare Society sat down together to reflect on the major events that took place during the pandemic period. Among them one event that touched us most was the plight of the migrant workers from Sundargarh district who returned home by various means of transportation: by bus, truck, cycle, or any other means they could find. As we were involved in helping them by providing food and water, we noticed the harsh reality of helplessness in their eyes. In our brainstorming session we felt the need for a center which would dedicatedly serve the cause of migrants. Through this, we hope to reach out to migrants from Sundargarh and its adjoining districts with a helping hand. By being in constant touch with migrants, we hope to empower them to get better organized.

Throughout the pandemic period, we had to close our daycare centres for the children of working parents. As the current year was more conducive to the regular way of living, we reopened this programme in Gopabandhupalli and Sheetalapara. Thus 2022-23 was a year of return to normalcy. The year saw a growth of our programmes in terms of participants and beneficiaries.

The year also witnessed several people partnering with us to help the poor and the marginalized in society. It is such a great feeling that there are several persons who are concerned about the plight of the poor and are willing to pitch in for their development. In CWS we believe that together we can make a difference in the lives of the poor and we are doing that through this platform.

Hence after a lot of reflection and planning, we opened a Migrants Help Desk in Rourkela on January 1st, 2023; a major addition to the list of CWS programmes this year.

## VISION AND MISSION

### Vision

Enhance the quality of life of the people of Rourkela especially its slum residents and the people living in Sundargarh and adjoining districts and in the state of Odisha.

### Mission

1. Form self-help groups among women, widows, youth, waste pickers, rickshaw pullers, street vendors and former leprosy patients living in the slums.
2. Improve health and hygiene through the promotion of community health and hospital services for slum residents.
3. Provide free home-based palliative care services to all residents of Rourkela and to people living in neighbouring areas.
4. Provide quality medical care to all through CWS Hospital, Jagda, Rourkela.
5. Create facilities and enabling environment for formal education of slum children.
6. Promote skill development among slum youth for gainful employment.
7. Organize seminars, meetings and training programmes on social issues and their amelioration among people living in the slums.
8. Make migration of unorganized workers from Odisha to other cities in India, safe and secure to the best possible extent.

## BIRD'S EYE VIEW OF CWS ACTIVITIES

I CWS works among the slum dwellers of Rourkela with special emphasis on more vulnerable sections of slum residents.



II CWS covers the entire city of Rourkela and the adjoining areas under free home-based palliative care programme.



III Sundargarh and the adjoining districts and the state of Odisha are served through CWS Hospital based in Rourkela, its research activities and CWS work among migrants from Odisha to other cities in India.



We work with and among the slum residents through 19 women animators and 06 project coordinators.

## EMPOWERMENT OF WOMEN

The main tool used for the empowerment of women is the formation of self-help groups (SHGs) of at least 10 women members. The groups provide women confidence, courage, and the strength to deal with problems which they may lack as individuals. The groups meet once in a month where their concerns are discussed, and plan of action decided. Minutes of the meeting and accounts of their savings are maintained. Loans are provided to members for

various needs from the group savings and group loans taken from the banks. The groups deal with family problems, local problems and all issues which concern them. They approach various departments of the government, local authorities, and political leaders for trouble shooting.



There are 619\*\* women SHGs with 7401 members.

## BEAUTY IS NOT SKIN DEEP

This is the story of Sangita Devi in her own words. “I, Sangita Devi reside at NIT-Dalposh. The financial condition of my family was miserable and the treatment I received from the mother-in-law was harsh. I lived a difficult life in poverty and sorrow. It was my ardent desire to acquire some skill and become financially independent. Luckily, I came to know about 2 months training programme for beauticians conducted by CWS at Sector 6. Alas! I didn’t have the money to pay for the course. By begging and borrowing I collected the required sum of money and joined the beautician training programme. At present I work as a beautician from home and provide beauty treatment to customers in their homes. My mother-in-law doesn’t persecute me anymore and I lead a fairly peaceful family life.”





## WIDOWS

Widows were part of women SHGs earlier. But experience of working with women showed that widows were more unequal than other women living in the slums. Hence SHGs exclusively of widows were formed to address their special concerns. There are 36 functional SHGs of widows.



## WIDOWS CAN BE VOCAL TOO

Widows are generally submissive and silent. But not always. A group of widows associated with CWS assembled in front of Additional District Magistrate's Office to submit a memorandum which asked for doubling of widow pension, timely transfer of pension to the bank account on a specified day every month and the issuance of BSKY card to all the widows.

## REHABILITATION OF LEPROSY AFFECTED PEOPLE

CWS entered the lives of leprosy affected people living in 5 colonies in different slums of Rourkela in 2017 at the request of Missionaries of Charity Brothers. There are other NGOs and government agencies too working in these same colonies.

People who got leprosy in the past and were forced out from their villages found refuge in these colonies.

CWS is also supplying freely dressing materials to residents of Jagannath Ashram.

## RICKSHAW PULLERS



CWS has been associated with Rickshaw pullers since 2015-16. Demand for rickshaws for transport of people is decreasing while of trolleys for the transport of goods in increasing.

Rickshaw pullers contribute a lot to reduce pollution and protect the environment without being aware of it, nor do those who use rickshaws are bothered about the noble contribution rickshaw pullers are making towards the society. All things considered rickshaws remain the most non-polluting means of transport and the rickshaw pullers deserve support and appreciation.

CWS animates and helps them to form SHG groups, encourage savings, promote the education of their children, improve their health and hygiene, and help them obtain identity documents so that they can enjoy the benefits of government grants and schemes.

## WASTE PICKERS



If there is a group of people whom the public wants to keep at arm's length, waste pickers will occupy the top slot. The reasons are their shabby appearance, degrading occupation, and the apprehension about being petty thieves. Unlike municipal waste collectors, informal waste pickers have neither uniform nor gloves or boots.

Our animators try to improve the lot of waste pickers by forming self-help groups, inspiring them to send their children to school, making available tuition facilities for their children and encouraging them to keep themselves and the surroundings clean and tidy.

Though waste pickers work is the job of last choice, their contribution to the economy and more so to the environment is considerable.

## A BROKEN CART AND A BROKEN HEART

Arati Haripal is a street vendor and a mother of two children residing at Bidya Nagri Basti of Sector 6. She earned a living by selling germinated Bengal gram and snacks. One night some young miscreants in a drunken state smashed her pushcart to pieces. In the morning when Arati saw the wreckage of the cart, it broke her heart. She contacted two animators of CWS and apprised them about her plight. A meeting of Gobindo SHG was called to deal with the problem faced by Arati. The group after assessing her problem recommended a loan of 5000 rupees for the purchase of a new pushcart. As the SHG did not have sufficient funds, CWS advanced 5000 rupees to Arati for the purchase of a new pushcart.

But this story does not have a happy ending. Or does it? After obtaining the loan Arati Haripal and her family moved away from Sector 6. Was her family under some threat in the old place? Where did they go? Will she restart her small business in the new place and make ends meet? Questions and more questions for which we have no answer.





## YUVA (Youth for Unity and Voluntary Action)

CWS has been working with the youth from 2016 through a project called YUVA (Youth For Unity and Voluntary Action). “Youth in the slums are often found to be getting involved in various criminal and negative activities. Lack of motivation, education, employment opportunities and support from parents take them further into non-productive activities.” Besides the old problems of alcohol abuse and drug addiction, new problems of cyber bullying, crime and financial frauds through smart phones are on the rise among the youth. Focus of our activity with youth is preventive rather than curative. At present 1277 youth are associated with the project as members of 122 SHGs. Among them 813 are girls and 464 are boys.

The stories of youth SHGs may appear run-off-the mill and very ordinary. But seen against the situation in the slums and the tendency of the youth not to be disciplined, these stories are extraordinary.

Young Star youth SHG is located in Subapally, Sector 6 Basti. It has 13 members. Out of them 9 are girls and 4 are boys. The monthly savings has been kept at Rs.50 per individual. Every month 9 to 10 members participate in the meeting. This SHG is looked after by Animator Sujata Samantray. Out of total deposit of 21450, six members have taken loan of 12850. Monalisa has taken 1550, Neha 700, Barsa 4500, Sanjay 1000, Pradunya 3500 and Preetimay 1600. Three youth work. Suraj works in Omfed, Sanjay works in steel plant and Pradunya combines study with work.

Nikita Pal is a member of Success youth SHG. Her parents are Panchami Pal and Pramila Pal. She has two brothers and a sister. Her father drinks alcohol and does odd jobs. He spends whatever he earns. Nikita was given financial aid for her studies and is doing her graduation. She works with a chemist and supports household expenses.

Nikhil Prasad, president of the Organization youth SHG, is a resident of Gopabandhupalli. His mother is a widow. His elder brother is running the house. Two years back, Nikhil's studies were hindered due to his elder sister's high expenditure in marriage. With the help of CWS, he passed +2 with 59% and is doing further studies this year.

Pragati Jena, is a member of Angel Youth. Her house is in Mahima Ashram Sector 6. Her father is a cook, and her mother is a homemaker. She has four sisters. She was sponsored for photo editing course by CWS. After completing the course, she is doing photo editing work in the studio and helping the parents in running the house.

Indian youth SHG has been formed in Madhusudan Pali. Out of 12 members, 6 are boys and 6 are girls. SHG bank account has been opened in Bank of India. Monthly savings has been kept at Rs.100. Four members have been able to do further studies by taking loan. One member took 12000 rupees for college admission. Aditya paid his tuition fee by taking 1000 rupees. Shruti Jha took 1600 for her studies. Kalyani was re-admitted to her college by taking a loan of 5000 rupees. Four members go for work. 8 to 10 people participate in each meeting.

Smart Youth Council has been formed on 17 March 2021 in Malgodam Basti. Out of 15 members, 6 are boys and 9 are girls. Eleven are studying, while four are working. President is Urmila Singh and Secretary is Manish Sahu. The members save 200 rupees every month. The group banks with Bank of India. It has a deposit of 24,259 rupees with the bank and 38,000 rupees are circulating as loans among the members. Urmila Singh has taken 1000 rupees, Bishnu Sahoo has taken 23,000 rupees, Manish Sahu 2,000, and Suhani 12,000 as loan. One of them, Bishnu Sahu, takes loan and sells vegetables and repays the loan. Loans have been their life saver in times of problems.

In terms of patients, area covered, and the services rendered at home, palliative care programme has been very satisfying. But there are also heart-rending cases of patients who are not properly looked after and are left to die without dignity. In such instances there is little our staff can do to provide succour to them.

Our nursing staff visit the enrolled patient twice or once a month in their homes according to the condition of the patient. Those who require palliative care suffer from serious ailments. “However, it is also true that some people with acute periods of illness recover, are cured or achieve optimized management of symptomatic disease and may no longer need palliative care after some time.” (Each Breath blog of American Lung Association Dec 1, 2020). We have number of patients who belong to this category. In subsequent pages we describe the story of two patients who have recovered and are leading normal lives.

## CWS SERVICES IN SUNDARGARH AND ADJOINING DISTRICTS AND THE STATE OF ODISHA

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### CWS HOSPITAL

CWS Hospital at Jagda, Rourkela is promoted by Community Welfare Society. This hospital was built with donations from various organizations and private individuals. The hospital which was commissioned in 2002 with 50 beds has grown into a 120 bed Hospital with excellent diagnostic facilities and intensive care (ICU) and high dependency (HDU) units. This hospital is staffed by experienced and committed medical professionals devoted to high-quality patient care. Further, it is our constant concern and commitment to provide quality patient care at an affordable cost. A great number of our patients are tribals or those belonging to the poorer sections of society.

Presently the Hospital has become a referral centre to many seriously and critically ill patients of Rourkela and its peripheries, interior villages of Sundargarh district and neighbouring states of Jharkhand and Chhattisgarh.

The hospital has met all the requirements for NABH accreditation and the final inspection of the hospital by NABH team took place on March 26, 2023.

We are confident about CWS Hospital getting NABH accreditation soon.

A health camp for public was organized at the hospital premises on the occasion of 20th anniversary celebration of the hospital. A large number of people benefitted from the health camp as prominent doctors of the hospital were present to conduct the health checkup of the patients. 519 patients benefitted from the camp.

## MIGRANTS HELP DESK (MHD)



Reaching out to those in greater need has been in the DNA of CWS from its very inception. Being true to its tradition, CWS has ventured into a new territory this year- of migrants. Odisha is a migrant sending state. There are lot of people from Odisha working as migrant labourers in the unorganised sector of the economy in different parts of India. They are neither very educated nor technically skilled. Their jobs can be hazardous, working conditions harsh, living conditions miserable, job security scarce and salaries low. Covid pandemic showed that nobody is certain even about the exact number of migrant labourers working in the unorganised sector. CWS has opened the Migrants Help Desk (MHD) to serve the migrants from Odisha working in different parts of India in the unorganized sector of the economy. Our aim is to make the life of the migrants safe, secure, and just to the best possible extent and network with other NGOs to help the migrants when they face problems.

We want to work with people who have already migrated and those who are planning to migrate in search of jobs. We have started a survey to come into contact with people who have migrated. We plan to cover 4000 migrants under this survey. In the beginning the survey will focus on areas in Sundargarh district with large migrant population. Later on it will cover other adjoining districts.

The survey is conducted with the help of religious leaders, panchayat authorities, community elders, influential leaders and anganwadi workers of a locality. We have already surveyed 1251 migrants from 23 places.

We get the phone number of migrants who are surveyed and encourage them to become members of whatsapp group of their locality. Eight such groups have been formed for Bihabandh, Kahupani, Kusumdegi, Tangrain, Jhirpani, Nuagaon, Bondamunda and Barilapta.

MHD has a dedicated phone number to answer the queries of migrants and to help them in times of trouble. We have received calls about migrants who have gone missing. Where even the police are helpless, there is little MHD can do to help the family people to trace their missing members. But when it is a question of harassment or a health problem MHD is able to help such migrants with the help of NGOs working in their locality.

## Research Progress-

CSCMi Study Type 3- A cluster randomized trial to assess the effectiveness of malaria camps as part of the Odisha state malaria elimination drive (Phase 2, CSCMi Study Type 3) is a field cum Lab based project, which is operated in the 6 districts of Odisha state. For phase 2 operation in India, our study proposal has been approved Health Ministry Screening Committee (HMSC), Govt. of India. Subsequently, we have submitted our proposal to Odisha state Ethics committee and got the level- 1 i.e., Sub-committee approval with final approval under processing.
2. In the pre monsoon season (July 2022) we survey two interior study villages of Keonjhar district with H&FW Dept. of Keonjhar.
3. During this 2022-23 financial year we have tested RDT kit for 154 patients in our lab for the malaria as per the doctor prescription and molecular detection at free of cost.
4. Total 08 nos of scrub typhus +ve cases were detected in this financial year and research is under process.
5. 01 nos of international training were conducted by New York University at our lab.
6. CWS Hospital was the co-organiser for the International Centres of Excellence for Malaria Research (ICEMR), international workshop which was conducted at Bhubaneswar, Odisha. In this workshop was attended by many malaria scientists, across the globe who presented their research work.
7. 01 no of PhD students from Sambalpur University is working in our Lab for his PhD thesis work and 01 MSc. Student from Chandigarh University successfully completed her internship under Dr Praveen K. Sahu.
